EIGHTH ANNUAL CORVETTES AND CRABS RALLYE

The Eighth Annual Corvettes and Crabs Rallye started with an overcast day and rain threatening; it scared Rob Succolosky into using his daily driver (not a corvette). We had nine cars attending: three Gen 4's ALL in red, two Gen 6s, two Gen 7s and one Gen 8, all of whom played the poker hands and seven who also answered questions along the rallye route. President Mike Gilliland and past presidents Dick Hammaker and Kris McCandless prepared for the day with blueberry and pecan pancakes at the Dumfries Cracker Barrel while waiting for attendees to line up.

This rallye was a return to Mike's and Kris's first Corvettes and Crabs Rallye of 2014, covering many of the same roads and even some of the same questions. Eighty-five turn arrows were counted along the fun and twisty Joplin Road, 6 to 10 birdhouses were counted along a stretch in Dumfries, and at least 3 stars were counted along Flory Road in Nokesville. In a traditional Crabs/Mike/Kris rallye, we had people crisscrossing other rallyers to hopefully get them off course (one of many tricks up the Rallye Masters' sleeves) and filling in sign information about all the sod farms they traveled through. Three Woofs [in the] Way from our first rallye now had a cute sign showing a dancing cow and dog, and our group of rallyers surprised the Rallye Masters with the correct count of 15 evergreen shrubs outside the fence of a tree farm. We got nearly all of them stumped, though, by asking who the dam was named for on Glenkirk Road on the last leg through Gainesville: T. Nelson Elliott. Still...there were a lot of smiles as everyone finished at Blue Ridge Seafood in a little more than two hours, rewarded by delicious popcorn shrimp, stuffed flounder, blue crabs, and hushpuppies. Not running the route but joining us at Blue Ridge Seafood on Rt. 29 in the far western reaches of Prince William County were Rustom and Nalini Desai, Doreen Kinashi, and Candace Rende.


IT WAS AN HONOR Bob Devery



Slowly, the group grew. There were toddlers, grammar school kids, teens, a cheerleader squad, parents, airport workers, an active duty Army squad. adults of all ages ... and a few of us from NVCC. All of us were together to welcome back to Dulles Airport a contingent of military veterans who had been in DC for the day to tour the monuments that were erected to recognize their service and enjoy a time for camaraderie. Men and women who had served their country in WW2, Korea, and Vietnam. Average people who, in many cases as indicated by the symbols that they wore on their hats or shirts/jackets that said, "Combat veteran", did extraordinary things on a battlefield that they thought were just the right thing to do for their country and for their fellow soldiers, sailors, airmen and marines.



The 90+ veterans ... easily recognizable in the



volunteers whose only thoughts were to make the day special for the entire group. We were briefed about 15 minutes before their arrival back at Dulles. Our "job" was simply to form a welcoming line in the terminal so that they would pass between those on both sides of a "corridor of appreciation". As you can see from the pictures, a nice line it was! The Honor Flight team leader said that she was extremely pleased with the turnout. I was especially impressed with the parents who brought their kids to the event to teach them to appreciate the veterans and our country.





It took a while for all the "Yellow Jackets" to pass in review as their pace is not quite what it was when they were in uniform. However, they were well aware of how much they were appreciated and showed it as they walked by us. There were smiles and heads held high. Some took or gave salutes. A few stopped briefly to say hello to one or more of the kids in attendance. All of them got the respect that they deserved. Rob. Mark. and I all agreed that the atmosphere for this event was special. Mark said that he had goosebumps. It takes a very different person

NOT to be moved by these type ceremonies. I know when I was in air traffic control at Dulles or in airport ops and was told that a flight was an Honor Flight, we did everything possible to ensure that no one on the ground or in the air got in the way of that aircraft. The only time a flight had more attention was to assist in the return of a service member killed in the line of duty. I must admit that this event was the first time that I actually fully participated in

it. It will not be the last. Although this event was the final Honor Flight of the year due to impending weather conditions in DC or at a departure point that would make the visit to DC not as safe as needed, they will resume in the spring. I assure you that it will end up on the Club calendar.

THE ROAD TO BAVARIA via WEST VIRGINIA

It started at Manassas cracker barrel at 10:30 AM Saturday. I joined at Stephen City Sheetz off Rt 81... 
VIENNA HALLOWEEN PARADE—2021


already cannot wait until next year. It was a beautiful fall night, and the Northern Virginia Corvette Club came out in full force to celebrate Halloween with Vienna's finest.








NVCC Christmas Lights Rallye Sunday Nov. 21st, 2021 6:00pm \$5.00/car (+entry fee)

Let's start with our 50th Anniversary Year, 2019. What a great year for blowout parties and happy memo-


ries. We began 2019 with an expanded banquet where we pushed out the wall at Maggiano's and brought in 12 past presidents.

of the Conference was getting to Bowling Green, KY, on some really great WV Corvette roads. The weather was great, traffic light....the 650 mile trip took 9 hours 30 minutes over and 9 hours 50 minutes back... two personal best times...normal time is about 11 hours.



VACATION UPDATE PSA ... WHAT TO EXPECT AS TRAVEL INDUSTRY ENTERS "REVENGE TRAVEL" 2022-2023

Bob Devery, the Travel Guy



Life is returning to normal for most people. I realize that the media blitz on Covid will cause some people to never travel again. In my opinion, it's a shame as the companies have all undertaken proper protocols to take care of major concerns. In the cruise biz, almost three quarters of a million guests have sailed on river and ocean cruises since June with 1,359 cases of covid reported among passengers and crew, 49 of which required hospitalization and one death. **There is no number other than ZERO that will make some okay with travel but a 0.0018% rate of covid infection is far less than the common cold or flu ANYWHERE.** These numbers are from The Washington Post (10/5/21) so it's not a number that is designed to make cruises look good. The Post did all it could to make covid look as bad as possible.** So, why are the rates so low? Common sense protocols have been in place: vaccinated adults onboard including ALL crew members and all guests over the age of 12, pre-cruise testing even if vaccinated, reduced capacity on cabins, onboard protocols for masks, etc. The cruise that a few of us from NVCC did in September in ALASKA showed that it works: ZERO cases of covid --OR ANY infectious flu, etc. -- out of 3,000+ passengers and crew. Land tours are reporting good results too, but with fewer people as Europe and Asia land tours are just restarting.

So, what's next for 2022? 2023?

First: cruise lines and tour operators will begin a GRADUAL return to 100% of available space. Our January cruise out of San Juan is still with reduced cabin use keeping a cabin in between guests. CDC leaves trying to run cruise ship business 1/15/22 so there will be more cabins available starting in spring as I feel the CEOs will stay with current restrictions thru March/April. Look for buffets to return to normal by year end. Masks will likely be phased out as a mandatory item in certain spaces after 1/15/22. Excursion tours will increase as tour operators get more employees back to work and "space limits" are reduced/eliminated.

Second: "costs will drop, right?" WRONG!!! The oil pipeline shutdowns have had a disastrous effect on cruise line costs as well as airlines. As we've seen, gas prices are up 50-100% in many areas over Jan. 20, 2021. The ships and tour operators running buses, etc., face the same price increases for gas/oil. Waiting to book is NOT NOT NOT a great idea. I can get good cruise prices with a group formed a year ago, etc., but the airlines are out for blood. I still find prices that are reasonable using packages for pre-cruise or land tour arrivals, but air is not a pretty item right now.

Third: capacity controls. Remember: MILLIONS as in MILLIONS of people had travel cancelled in 2020-2021. They have credits to use. They ARE booking heavily for 2022-23. So, if you think that waiting is a good idea to get a lower price, you might have a rare occasion with waiting until a month before travel, BUT YOU WON'T get a flight or a cabin or a land tour slot. Europe, Alaska, and "exotics" are being booked 12-18 months in advance. Caribbean cruises that normally had 6-month advanced booking now book 9-12 months in advance. Our Viking cruise for the Rhine out of Basel, Switzerland for 10/1/22 was sold out of suites and veranda cabins TWO MONTHS AGO. Many land tours for South America, Asia, and Europe for 2022 are sold out already and 2023 bookings are heavy.

BOTTOM LINE: there are SO many variables in the travel biz now that it's numbing. I have calls/briefings that I can attend EVERY DAY. Companies are changing rules, protocols, vaccine requirements weekly. What's up on passports, etc.? On occasion, I have to go back to clients the next day because a new bulletin has arrived affecting them. To be safe on getting travel set, be vaccinated. It's not a political statement -- just reality. Not all travel companies are requiring it, and less will be doing it after spring arrives. Just be prepared for rejection if you are not vaccinated at the moment. We CAN book if NOT vaccinated but, at time of travel, you may be required to show vaccine card. I expect a change in that criteria in 2022. Since changes can occur quickly, contact me with questions for CURRENT data.

BUT WHY CALL YOU WHEN I CAN DO IT MYSELF? A fair question ... ALL of you can use the internet where there are 10,000+ travel suppliers. Many like some of my suppliers (say CENTRAV for airlines) simply take a price from Expedia, add a \$12 pp fee and say, "here's my great price"! I despise what they do so rarely use them UNLESS it's an overseas block price that they have which saves my clients a fair amount. Cruises .. "I can beat what you have by going direct to the cruise line right?" ... NO ... not really. MY company Expedia Cruises is one of the world's largest booking suppliers worldwide. Our "blocks/group bookings" give us a big advantage on most cruises. I AM going to beat any price that you see the extreme majority of the time. Also, bluntly, out of 6,000+ travel planners with Expedia, I'm #125 in rankings.

LAST: when you book with me, NVCC gets a donation. It might be only \$25, \$100 or \$500+ BUT it is FREE money for the Club. Money that they do NOT get when you book with Travelocity, Royal Caribbean, Viking, Tauck, etc. This donation is OUT OF MY POCKET as a way to say THANKS to the Club. You take the time to ask me to book travel -- I do all the work for you -- get you the LOWEST PRICE, make the booking, follow-up AND give NVCC a donation. When you booked your last internet trip, did NVCC get a donation? I've written checks to NVCC EVERY TIME -- not occasionally, but EVERY TIME that a member has booked with me. AND when you travel with an NVCC group, you WILL have a great time as we ALWAYS have fun! WHERE and WHEN do you want to go? Give me a chance to prove that I can do what I say... lower price for you and donation to NVCC.
